An Internal Audit of your Herd and Your Program

The Internal Audit: A Key to Useful Seedstock

Every cattle breeder who sells "seedstock" must ask himself: what is the role of the seedstock breeder, and how do I know if my product is useful? Once he has answered those questions, the breeder will have to understand that his (or her) internal audit, his vigilance in observing, judging and culling his herd will be critical to producing and marketing cattle that can gain a reputation as useful.

To be useful to the commercial cattle industry, "purebred" bulls and females must be productive, fertile, hardy, well-muscled, and they must be raised in conditions similar to those in

which their progeny will live and produce. The list goes on. Cattle raised in a seedstock operation can't be pampered in ways a commercial cattleman can't afford. They should not be "performance tested" in environments that are totally removed from the ranges on which they will spend their lives, and while eating feedstuffs that are different from the forages on which they will be asked to live and produce.

A breeder must make the tough decisions; he is the only one who can insure that every defective animal is pulled out of the herd. No

breed association official or other outsider can know all the details of what goes on in the back forty. Only the breeder can be sure that every outstanding bull calf out of a cow that had to be milked is castrated so that trait is not propaated through other herds. (Do you know how many "great" AI bulls have produced females who had bad bags?). Only the breeder can cull a pretty heifer calf whose dam prolapsed, or had some other genetic defect that would otherwise be passed on to future generations and to unsuspecting buyers.

This is the internal audit, and it is critical.

Recently we received a thank you note from a customer: "The new mother in the attached picture is 23 months old. She was sired by the Foundation herd bull you

few years ago. All of his daughters have calved on or before their 2nd birthday, have good

udders, and are excellent mothers."

His note was short, but it reminded us of certain things that are important, even essential.
